from the pastor

O Come, O Come, Emmanuel,
And ransom captive Israel,
That mourns in lonely exile here,
Until the Son of God appear.
Rejoice! Rejoice!
Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel!

Kneeling beside the cool water on the banks of the Euphrates River, staring across the nearly six hundred miles of harsh desert sand that lay between Babylon and Jerusalem, an unknown musician gave voice to Israel's longing for home: "How can we sing the Lord's song in a foreign land?" (Psalm 137) How can we sing of God's abundance in a land of scarcity? How to sing of hope when we are oppressed daily by our Babylonian overlords? Turning from the river, this musician looked into the eyes and faces of his neighbors, wasted by hope that never came. Gazing again at the river he sings, "There we lay down our harps and wept." Israel-in-exile longed for home, and God seemed very far away indeed.

Advent is a melancholy season. In the midst of the festive lights and holiday cheer, we in the church are invited to acknowledge that we still share with ancient Israel a longing to experience the fullness of life that God has promised us. We are not yet the people God created us to be; we do not live the way God intends to us to live; and no amount of holiday parties or consumer spending will change that. Our families experience increased pressures on time and budget, we struggle to maintain gospel values in a market saturated with violent entertainment, we recoil at invitations to gorge ourselves on food, products and even relationships. All the while many of us are grieving, as the holidays approach, and we remember loved ones who will not be with us for the first time (or the thirtieth time).

Emmanuel means God-with-us, or stated as a promise, "God-is-with-us." And that makes all the difference. The promise of Emmanuel means that we do not need to travel to go home, but that our God has come to be at home with us and among us. God-is-with-us means that we don't have to stuff ourselves with things that do not satisfy. Emmanuel reminds us that, in Christ, the loved ones who have gone before us are embraced by the same one who comforts and guides us.

During the coming weeks, our congregation is a place where we may come together and be honest about our needs and longings, even as we trust that God is with us and goes with us today, tomorrow and tomorrow.

We have just entered the period known as Advent. Advent marks the four weeks leading up to Christmas, during which we turn our attention, and our hearts, toward the coming of Christ, both incarnate once as the babe laid in the manger, and also promised in the new creation. Advent is also the beginning of the liturgical year, the annual cycle of seasonal remembrances that we mark in weekly worship. While the secular calendar winds down towards the close of yet another weary year, the church has just celebrated the beginning of a new year. This is just one more way, although a minor one, in which the church stands as countercultural.

Sunday, November 27, was the first Sunday in Advent. During coffee hour following worship, all our families had the opportunity to create Advent wreaths to take home to use during the next four weeks. The tradition of lighting a candle at home each Sunday, accompanied by a short reading, gives everyone the opportunity to pause, ponder and teach children the true meaning of

Christmas, which is sometimes lost in our busy season of holiday preparations and celebrations. In this way, we are able to link worship, education and home, thereby handing our faith on to the younger generation.

INTRODUCING SARAH HENKEL

Cross-Cultural Ministry Coordinator for the Hudson River Presbytery

I grew up in Secaucus, NJ where my father served as pastor of the First Reformed Church and my mother served as School Administrator for the Mustard Seed School in Hoboken, NJ. Our house was and is a place of hospitality; it was a rare night that our guest bedroom was not filled. My call to ministry can be traced back to our dining room table where people from all over the world, from all walks of life broke bread together.

It is the challenges and joys of community life that led me into the PC(USA) as an adult. Through my work at *Manos de Cristo*, a Presbyterian ministry in Austin, TX, I found a home in the PC(USA) and a call to be in the places where faith, community, and service meet. I attended Princeton Theological Seminary and, post-graduation, I moved to McAllen, TX where I worked at the South Texas Civil Rights Project and worshipped with *Iglesia Menonita Buenas Nuevas*, a bilingual and multicultural church on the border. On 1/1/11 I married my life partner, Will Summers, at *Iglesia Menonita* in a Presby-Mennonite service featuring hundreds of tamales and joyful accordion music.

In addition to my role as Cross-Cultural Network Coordinator with the Hudson River Presbytery, I am excited to join White Plains Presbyterian in outreach efforts as we seek to extend the welcome to more people in the White Plains community. I am in awe of the diversity that God has created and is creating in our world and I am excited by the work that we will do together to honor and celebrate that diversity. As a middle-class, Euro-American woman, I bring my particular experiences and voice to the table as we are about the work of reconciliation and hope. I am looking forward to meeting many of you at the table, to hearing your stories, and to together setting places for many more. Will and I are beyond grateful for the hospitality this congregation has shown us already in opening 46 Rockledge to us as a home. It is that same spirit of hospitality and generosity that will continue to transform and grow the life of your church. I am looking forward to witnessing and walking with you on the journey.

Session/Council Snippets

Deirdre Lewin, Clerk of Session

There was much to be grateful for at the Session meeting on October 25th. Great appreciation was expressed for the many members and friends of the church who give so much time and energy to our mission causes, with the spotlight being on the Nifty Thrifties (Barbara Barnes, Beryl Dilworth, Carmen Grey, Milme and Russell Hoag, Edna Shaw) and all the work they do to make the tag sale so successful. As we also looked at the fund raising efforts for SHORE Thor Andersen automatically came to mind with his twenty plus years of devotion to this cause. Truly all are the "hands of Christ" right here in our own community.

The major issue of the night was discussion about the house the church has owned for many years at 46 Rockledge Ave. At this time of transition as tenants have or are reaching the end of their leases a committee had been named at a previous session meeting to look at the issue in detail. We consulted our own finance commission as well as the relevant committee of Presbytery, obtained legal advice, and consulted with the White Plains tax assessor. These are the recommendations that session then approved at the meeting in October. We will be offering the downstairs apartment to Sara Henkel, who is serving on the Cross-Cultural Ministry of Presbytery. The apartment will be rent free and in return Sarah, as our Parish Associate, will give us 10 hours weekly focusing her work on community outreach. (Sarah introduced herself elsewhere in this issue of Response.) There will be a fee for utilities and for maintenance costs and she will be responsible for general day-to-day homeowner's property care. (You will have heard Sara speaking from the pulpit on November 13th). The use of the upstairs apartment is being reviewed and currently the expected plan is to rent it early in the New Year. Jeff will be facilitating the implementation of these steps, with appropriate legal advice and formal agreements in place as soon as possible.

Session will meet again the week after Thanksgiving. On behalf of us all on Session, we hope you had a blessed Thanksgiving. As for myself I know our church, its staff, our minister and volunteers are very high on my "Thank You" list of blessings.


